From time to time I like to update our membership with regard to what states, other than our own, recognize the PA concealed firearms carry permit. Let me say that our Attorney General Tom Corbett has done an outstanding job working out reciprocity agreements with other states and deserves your consideration in the November election. The PA Concealed Firearms Carry Permit is now recognized in twenty six states. That's right; over half the states in the nation will recognize the PA permit. These states are Pennsylvania, Florida, Kentucky, Georgia, Michigan, Wyoming, Alaska, Idaho, Indiana, Montana, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Vermont, New Hampshire, Texas, Utah, South Dakota, Missouri, Virginia, West Virginia, Colorado, Louisiana, North Dakota, Arizona, and Arkansas.

As of this writing the Wild Bunch has not released the agenda for the Territorial Governor Convention in Las Vegas to the TG's. As you can imagine this has caused no small stir among the TG's who are tasked with representing their individual clubs wishes on these various items of discussion. The untimely release of the agenda gives TG's less time to gather their clubs feelings. I will, hopefully, have the agenda by the October meeting and perhaps we can talk about them then and come to some conclusions. I myself will not be going to the convention in Las Vegas but will give my proxy vote to another TG who will be going. So your desires will be carried to the meeting; your input is important. From the Deputy

The 4th week of Sept. will be the start of 17 years of shooting cowboy action shooting with SASS and during those years I've shot a lot of matches all over the U.S. I've torn down and help setup a lot of them also, too many to want to remember. I started to shoot in Sept. 1992 at the Appalachian Showdown, one of the only places that did cowboy action shooting then on the east coast. I've learned a lot of things since then and met a lot of people that I still talk to. Back when I started there were no RO schools, so you followed the rules at the club you were shooting at. As new clubs came about, they had different rules and that meant you changed with the rules or you didn't shoot. Then SASS started the RO schools to try and get all the clubs to shoot the same way, thus rules. Now, I've written lots of matches and been match director for them and have always asked people to tell me what I did wrong and what I did right in writing them. Big Fred and Punch would always let me know how I screwed up stages, and let me know if I wrote a good one, lots of times right in front of the posse shooting it. I would listen to him and Punch and others that had comments, I guess you could call it constructive criticism. When I designed a stage again, I would remember what I did wrong and make sure I didn't repeat it. Never end a stage with a rifle because the timer didn't pickup rifle shots every time, try and keep it SASS category friendly, keep the rifle and hand gun sweeps the same, keep it safe and fun and stay away from procedural traps in a stage and other things, so it would be fun to shoot both the new shooter and the shooter that had been doing it for a long time. Out of all the years I've been shooting, the only thing that I did not like was handoffs and that was from a horse or when you had a gun malfunction. I would rather ground it, in a safe direction when I'm not on a horse and come back after the stage and take it to unloading table and deal with the problem or give someone permission to look at it if I couldn't fix it. What if the person taking the gun drops it and makes the problem worse, or takes it back to the unloading table and starts messing with it and breaks it or it goes off, who gets the DQ? Even if he thought he was trying to help, he just made the problem worse. You have to pay to get it fixed. People that shoot this sport have lots of money tied up in firearms, like action jobs, and other things, so they don't like people fooling with them, unless they're asked to. I don't want to be asked to pay for the repair of a firearm that wasn't mine and I tried to fix. As a match director it is always nice to be offered help in any way with a match. After writing stages for a long time a person starts to run out of ideas, if you don't believe me just ask Mariah. So, a person that wants to write stages is a good relief, You learn as you go with writing stages and thank god I had Fuzzy to talk things over with as to what I could and couldn't do in a stage. But, whether it is a whole stage or just a few, a stage writer has to understand a few things. A stage has to be written so male or female, new, old, gamers, juniors, buckaroos, or handicapped can shoot it. It should be SASS category friendly, as much as possible. The stage must be written as to know the time it takes for the posse to get to the stage till they leave the stage when everyone is done shooting it. By this I mean you start to sentiment the time for the posse to get to the stage, reading the story, how to shoot it, answer any questions, how many new shooters on your posse, how many people in your posse, getting first shooter loaded and to the line, What you have to do first before any of this is take average fast shooter time it takes him to run a stage and the average slowest person to run it and get a average time and take that times how many people are in the posse and add these all together for time it takes the posse to shoot the stage. Don't forget to also add in the times between shooters for stage setup and brass pickup. Brass pickup should be from the time the TO yells range clear till he yells next shooter. After adding these times together you know how long it takes to shoot a stage. Then take that times six and you have a good idea how long the match will take. This has to be looked at when writing stages and to run a match. The person writing the stages should be there when the stages are setup for the match, so the people helping setup know where to set the targets and the stage writer can make adjustments if necessary. Because the day of the match they will be the match director and will take all the heat for problems that may arise, and there will be. (Been there) There are a few things that a person should try to understand when writing stages and these are but a few of them. The more a person writes stages the better they get and they will learn a lot more in the future, so those writing stages don't let people get you down, because I think if Jesus wrote a stage you'd still have people complain about it. God bless the new stage writers because us old guys are getting older every day, and will be able to say someday "Don't look at me I didn't write it."
